Butterflies and Caterpillars Nurseries

There are 2 Nurseries available at Framwellgate Moor Primary School: The

Butterflies and The Caterpillars. FFE places are provided in both Nurseries, therefore fruit and milk will be provided in both Nurseries. The placement of children is reviewed each term in order to increase the capacity of FFE places each term.

Butterflies

The Butterflies Nursery offers 15 or 30* hours per week provision for 3 year old children who will be going to Reception the following September.

Pupils are offered the following:

15 hours Nursery

 $5 \times \text{am}$ (8.30am—11.30am), $5 \times \text{pm}$ (12.30pm-3.30pm), $2 \cdot 1/2 \text{ days beginning of week (all day Mon/Tue and Wed am) or <math>2 \cdot 1/2 \text{ days end of week (Wed pm and all day Thur, Fri)}$.

In addition to the 15 hours free provision, Regular Wrap Around Care sessions can be booked in the Butterflies Nursery.

30 hours Nursery

Parents are able to choose any combination of the following sessions to equal 30 hours:

7.30am-8.30am - 1 hour

8.30am-2.30pm - 6 hours

2.30pm-3.30pm - 1 hour

Caterpillars

The Caterpillars Nursery offers 2 year old, Rising 3 and 3 year old places from the term following a child's 2nd or 3rd birthday.

2 Year old and Rising 3 Nursery

All children can access the Nursery for the term after they become 2.

This can be paid for by Parents or in some cases can be free to families in receipt of one or more of the following benefits:

- o Income Support
- o Job Seekers Allowance
- O Support for 'Looked After' Child
- o Child Tax Credit—income below £16,190
- O Guaranteed Element of State Pension Credit
- O Support under the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- o Employment and Support Allowance—income related
- o Disability Living Allowance (child)
- O Working Tax Credits and earn no more than £16,190
- ${f o}$ Current Statement of Special Educational Needs or an Education, Health and Care Plan (child)
- o Left care through Special Guardianship, or an Adoption or Residence Order.



3 Year old Nursery

The Caterpillars Nursery offers 15 or 30* hours per week provision for 3 year old children who are eligible for 4 or 5 terms of Nursery provision (children born between September and March).

Pupils are offered the following:

15 hours Nursery

5 x am (8.30am—11.30am), 5 x pm (12.30pm-3.30pm), 2 1/2 days beginning of week (all day Mon/Tue and Wed am) or 2 1/2 days end of week (Wed pm and all day Thur, Fri).

In addition to the 15 hours free provision, regular Wrap Around Care sessions can be booked in the Caterpillars Nursery.

30 hours Nursery

Parents are able to choose any combination of the following sessions to equal 30 hours:

7.30am-8.30am - 1 hour

8.30am-2.30pm - 6 hours

2.30pm-3.30pm - 1 hour



National Curriculum

School follows the programmes of study set out in the framework for the national curriculum 2014. The curriculum consists of:

English Maths) known as Core Subjects Science computing RE History Geography Art known as Foundation Subjects D.T. P.E. Music French PSHCE

The Foundation Stage (Nursery and Reception) follow the Early Years Foundation Stage statutory curriculum.

As a result of our extensive work developing the new curriculum, cross curricular links between subjects are made whenever it is appropriate.

Children learn subjects through a theme-based approach delivered in a meaningful way so that skills taught can then be applied by children in an appropriate and relevant setting. All themes are underpinned by a range of information software packages.

We believe strongly in developing a creative approach to all subjects.

A brief outline of these themes follows, however specific details are given to parents at the beginning of each term by the class teacher.

The New National Curriculum was implemented in September 2014. The skills taught will continue to be done so with a creative approach to learning and topics/themes will continue to be implemented.

School Life

Class Organisation

The children are organised in classes according to age and have one teacher for the academic year, some classes within a key stage may work together for various aspects of the Curriculum.

School uniform and Jewellery

We expect all children to wear school uniform. School uniform consists of:

- *Royal blue sweatshirt available from office or online at www.stparents.co.uk
- *White or pale blue polo shirt available from office or online at www.stparents.co.uk
- *Black/grey trousers/skirt
- *Black school shoes

In addition to sweatshirt and polo shirts, fleeces and school bags can also be purchased from the office or online at www.stparents.co.uk.

It is important that all school uniform is named correctly.

Training shoes are required for PE in Key Stage 1 and 2. School provides P.E. kit for all of our pupils.

For safety reasons jewellery must <u>NOT</u> be worn to school, except wristwatches. However, newly pierced ears can be covered with tape for six weeks. We suggest that ears are pierced at the beginning of the summer holidays to avoid this problem.

Hair should be suitable for school and to avoid the risk of head lice we suggest that long hair be tied up.

The school does not accept any responsibility for loss, theft or damage to any personal items of property, clothing or jewellery.

Nursery and Reception Class

We take part in the Government's fruit scheme; children receive a piece of fruit daily and a carton of milk up to the age of 5, if your child has an allergy please let us know.

We politely request that children do not bring additional drinks into school, except as part of their packed lunch, if they are not staying for school dinner.

School Meals

Lunchtimes are 12.00pm – 1.00 pm for KS2, and 12.00pm – 1.15 pm for KS1 and Reception. We try to encourage children to stay for school lunch as this provides pupils with a nutritious, well balanced meal. There will be a hot vegetarian or hot meat dinner and salad/cold meat and vegetarian option.

Taylor Shaw hold the School Meals contract for Durham Local Authority. Menus are sent home with pupils to allow parents to discuss options available with their child.

From September 2014 pupils in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 will be entitled to Free School Meals and pupils in Year 3, Year 4, Year 5 and Year 6 will be required to pay £2.05 per day.







Attendance

We expect all children on roll to attend every day when the school is in session, as long as they are fit and healthy to do so. We do all we can to encourage children to attend and we believe that the most important factor in promoting good attendance is a positive attitude towards school. To this end, we strive to make our school a happy and rewarding experience for all children. We reward those children whose attendance is very good.

School keeps attendance registers at the start of the morning and afternoon session of the school day.

If a child is absent the class teacher will record the absence in the register and inform the school office who will contact parent/guardian straightaway. A note should be sent to school prior to the date of absence if the child has a medical appointment.

Request for leave of absence – we believe that all children should be in school for all sessions so that they can make the best progress possible. If, however, your child needs to be away from school for reasons other than illness, then please request a leave of absence form from the school office. No holidays will be authorised following the Local Authority Guidance.



Behaviour - Code of Conduct

The school has an established code of conduct. We try at all times to recognise and reward good behaviour. We do this through the allocation of points on dbprimary.

200 - Certificate

500 - Lucky Dip - stationery

1000 - Head Teacher Certificate and a £1.50 voucher to spend in the school stationery shop

unfortunately some behaviour requires sanctions. These sanctions are recorded on a weekly behaviour chart and include: Verbal warning, miss playtime, time out of class, loss of Golden Time, contact parents and in extreme cases, exclusion.

Assessment/Reporting

Children's understanding is assessed continuously through observation, discussion, marking of work and more formal testing. Staff and pupils share targets for improvement so pupils are clear about what they need to do to succeed.


There are Year 1 Phonics Tests, and assessments take place at the end of KS1 (YR2), and KS2 (YR6).

To keep you informed of your child's progress, we host open evenings each term and parents receive progress reports during the Autumn and Spring Terms, with a more detailed annual report during the Summer Term.

Staff are more than happy to discuss your child's progress at any other time during the year. Please do not hesitate to contact us.

Homework

An important element of learning is the completion of homework. Parents are encouraged to support their children in the completion of homework. We expect all children to read for a minimum of 10 minutes each school evening and complete at least one piece of homework each week depending upon age.





Safeguarding

Here at Framwellgate Moor Primary School we take our Safeguarding responsibilities very seriously. The emotional and physical wellbeing of your child is paramount and always comes first. Rigorous systems are in place to ensure children's safety when in school. Parents send their children to school each day with the expectation that school provides a safe and secure environment in which children can flourish. The whole school community is committed to ensuring that policies and procedures, as well as regular staff training, provide such an environment.

Concerns

The school works closely with other support agencies and when there are concerns the school has a duty to share information both with the agency concerned and the parents.

If staff have concerns these concerns are reported to The Designated Child Protection Officer. The Designated Child Protection Officer is Mrs B Smith.

<u>Special Educational Needs</u>

Staff work incredibly hard to ensure an accessible learning environment, however, for some pupils, extra specialist advice, support or provision is required. We believe in early identification and have well established relationships with county teams for learning/behaviour support.

<u>Assemblies and R.E.</u>

Framwellgate Moor Primary School is non-denominational. The R.E. curriculum follows the Local Authority agreed syllabus. We believe that a major strength of our school is that we have a wealth of cultural diversity which brings a magic into our curriculum and school life. It encourages tolerance and understanding.

<u>Computing</u>

Computing and Digital Literacy Skills are taught and then embedded throughout all areas of learning. Control technology, classroom computers, iPads and laptops are used as tools for teaching and learning.



Breakfast Club - Munch Bunch

Breakfast Club takes place each morning from \mathcal{F} .30am - 8.45am. The charge is £4.00 per day (payable 1 week in advance). 
